Coldwater: Strong Today, Planning for Tomorrow

Dear Families and Community Members,

As we move into October, I am once again filled with gratitude and pride for the Coldwater Exempted Village Schools community. The dedication, kindness, and commitment of our staff, students, and families continue to set our district apart and make Coldwater an incredible place for learning and growth.



Report Card Results

I am proud to share the results of this year's Ohio School Report Card:

- Our district again earned an impressive **4.5-star rating**, **significantly exceeding state standards**.
- Our Performance Index improved and remained above 100, demonstrating consistent academic strength.
- Building by building, the Elementary earned 5 stars, the Middle School received 4.5 stars, and the High School received 4 stars.

It's important to remember that the state's rating system is built on complex algorithms. For example, the **Progress component** is based on a **three-year average**, so growth takes time to show in the data. Even with these complexities, our results are a strong testament to the efforts of our students and staff.

We are drilling deeply into the data to identify where we can continue to improve. I believe Coldwater is **on the cusp of achieving a 5-star district rating**—a distinction reached by only **5.4% of districts in Ohio**.

More Than Test Scores

While these results are worth celebrating, we know they only measure a snapshot of our students' performance on tests taken once a year. At Coldwater, we believe education is more than test scores. We remain committed to a **holistic approach**, focusing on the whole child—academically, socially, and emotionally.

Our mission is clear: to be **student-centered and relationship-driven**. We want every student to feel valued, chal-

lenged, and supported as they grow in both knowledge and character.

Investing in Our Future

As we celebrate academic success, we are also formalizing **plans to update our facilities infrastructure**. At the same time, we are developing a **10–15 year roadmap** to ensure viability and sustainability for the future. This includes **putting away reserves for areas of need** while making upgrades today.

We are engaging with and exploring the insights of **third-party experts** to help us assess, prioritize, and plan in a way that ensures we remain financially responsible while continuing to meet the needs of our students and community. This work will be ongoing, but it is essential to protecting the long-term health of our district.

Enhancing Communication

Listening to feedback, we are also **updating how we share information** with you. Starting this month, we will produce **two Cav Connection newsletters each quarter**:

- A mailed version that is concise—under 15 pages—with the most pertinent information.
- An **online version** that will include all the supplemental details our community has grown accustomed to, typically in the **40–60 page format**.

This approach provides the best of both worlds: a **cost savings** for the district while still delivering the depth of information and transparency that our community values.

The Heart of Our Success

The real strength of Coldwater Schools lies in the daily interactions happening in our classrooms, hallways, and fields. The culture we've built together—where relationships come first—remains our most important asset. As I often say, the culture of a school is not just one thing; it is the only thing.

Looking Ahead

I could not be prouder of our students and staff. Their resilience, creativity, and determination inspire me daily. Thank you for trusting us with the education of your children and for being partners in this journey. Together, we will continue to Protect the Shield and ensure that Coldwater remains a place where every student can thrive—while **significantly exceeding state standards** year after year.

FROM THE DESK OF THE TREASURER, JENN MCCOY:

Forecast Presentations

The Ohio Legislators have changed the format and dates for financial forecast submission. I will be presenting our current forecast at our October 14 board meeting. This forecast will include the forecasted income tax revenues from the recent levy passage. My most recent forecast was 98.7% accurate for revenues and 99.6% accurate for expenditures.



<u>Legislative & Policy Update: How State Property Tax Reform May Impact Schools</u>

This week brought several important developments that could affect how our schools are funded. We will continue to monitor these bills and provide updates. Your awareness and engagement are vital as these decisions could shape the future of school funding and local property taxes.

House & Senate Override Governor DeWine's Veto Item No. 66

Both the House and Senate have now voted to override Governor DeWine's veto of Item No. 66 in the biennial budget bill. As a result, Coldwater Schools will no longer have the ability to renew our Emergency Levy, leading to an annual revenue loss of \$550,000 beginning in fiscal year 2028. In addition, the state's reimbursement of the property tax rollback for Coldwater tax-payers has been eliminated, shifting a greater financial burden directly onto our local community.

1. Property Tax Reform Hearings

- Lawmakers are actively debating **House Bill (HB) 186** ("Inflation Cap Credit") and **HB 335** (a larger property tax overhaul).
 - HB 186: Would apply retroactively to 2023–24 reappraisals, expand to Joint Vocational School Districts, require tax bill itemization, and remove state funding offsets. This could create serious budget and legal challenges for our school.
 - Coldwater Schools is projected to lose \$686,704 in Tax Year 2025, \$1,054,237 in Tax Year 2026 and \$1,054,237 in Tax Year 2027 which is 11%, 14.8%, 14.8% respectively. This would be detrimental to our finances.
 - ♦ **HB 335**: Could become the main tax reform bill. A substitute version may place new limits on **inside millage growth**, which could reduce school revenue in the future.
- Other bills under discussion include:
 - ♦ **HB 129**: Would adjust the 20-mill floor by counting all fixed-sum levies.
 - ♦ **HB 309**: Would allow county budget commissions to reduce certain school levies they view as "excessive."


2. Why This Matters for Schools

- Property tax changes directly affect how much funding districts receive for classrooms, staff, and programs.
- Some proposals under consideration could **reduce school revenues** and shift **more financial pressure onto local taxpayers** or district budgets.

Arrival/Dismissal Reminders

These reminders/expectations are set up to keep all students and adults safe. Please follow these expectations:

<u>All Coldwater community members</u> who are driving near the school during arrival (7:45-8:20 a.m.) and dismissal (2:55-3:20 p.m.) times, please drive slowly, carefully and be mindful of pedestrians traveling across crosswalks. This is a school zone and the speed limit is 20 m.p.h.

<u>Adults and students, please use the CROSSWALKS</u> when crossing Vine Street especially during arrival and dismissal times. Little eyes are watching what you do. Please set great examples for them.

ARRIVAL

If your child is not a bus rider, we are asking them to enter at the assigned doors:

- 3rd & 4th Grade Students: Circle Drive Door #13 (Pit)
- Kindergarten & 2nd Grade: Elementary Playground Door #11
- 1st Grade: Circle Drive Door #12 (Elevator)
- * If you are parking your car to walk your child across Vine St. in the morning, please ONLY park in the Visitor's Parking Lot. DO NOT park in the numbered spaces as those have been reserved for Coldwater Elementary Staff. (Staff arrive at various times throughout the morning.)
- * Please remember that parents ARE NOT allowed to walk their child(ren) to the classroom without permission. If you need something from the office, please stop at the office window.

Again, our goal is to get all of our students into the elementary school in the safest way possible.

DISMISSAL (Car Rider) REMINDERS

- The best and safest way to pick up your child at the end of the day in a car is to use the Circle Drive line.
- If you want to park and walk across Vine St. to pick up your child, you may do so. We ask that you park in the Visitor's Parking Lot.
- If you do park in the lot, we ask that you walk across at the crosswalk to pick up your child. Please do not tell your child to walk over to your car in the parking lot on their own. This is not safe.
- When driving through the elementary parking lot...SLOW DOWN and PAY ATTENTION. When exiting the lot, please do not turn right. You may only turn left as we have many students walking to the CPAC and track/football field.
- If you are waiting for an elementary or middle school student in the car rider line or get out to help your child get in or buckle up, please pull up in front of the red cone so others waiting to pick up their child(ren) can continue to move through the line.
- Together, we all have the collective responsibility to keep all of our children safe during dismissal time.

We want to continue to have an awesome and safe school year! Please help us accomplish this goal!

- ⇒ What's the coolest thing that happened? What wasn't so cool?
- ⇒ Pretend you're the teacher. How would you describe the day?
- ⇒ What made you laugh today?
- ⇒ What was the most creative thing you did?
- ⇒ How were you kind or helpful today? Was anyone kind or helpful to you?
- ⇒ Describe a book you enjoyed today.
- ⇒ Tell me what you learned that you'd like to know more about.
- ⇒ Let's see what you worked on today?
- ⇒ Show me what you have for homework?
- ⇒ Tell me what you learned that you would like to know more about?

CAVALIER "Ready to Learn" TIPS

(U.S. Department of Education: Reading Tips for Parents)

"The Five Essential Components of Reading"

Reading with children and helping them practice specific reading components can dramatically improve their ability to read. Scientific research shows that there are five essential components of reading that children must be taught in order to learn to read. Adults can help children learn to be good readers by systematically practicing these five components:

- A Recognizing and using individual sounds to create words, or phonemic awareness. Children need to be taught to hear sounds in words and that words are made up of the smallest parts of sound, or phonemes.
- Understanding the relationships between written letters and spoken sounds, or phonics. Children need to be taught the sounds individual printed letters and groups of letters make. Knowing the relationships between letters and sounds helps children to recognize familiar words accurately and automatically, and "decode" new words.
- Developing the ability to read a text accurately and quickly, or reading fluency. Children must learn to read words rapidly and accurately in order to understand what is read. When fluent readers read silently, they recognize words automatically. When fluent readers read aloud, they read effortlessly and with expression. Readers who are weak in fluency read slowly, word by word, focusing on decoding words instead of comprehending meaning.
- ♦ Learning the meaning and pronunciation of words, or vocabulary development. Children need to actively build and expand their knowledge of written and spoken words, what they mean and how they are used.
- Acquiring strategies to understand, remember and communicate what is read, or reading comprehension strategies. Children need to be taught comprehension strategies, or the steps good readers use to make sure they understand text. Students who are in control of their own reading comprehension become purposeful, active readers.

"Simple Strategies for Creating Strong Readers"

- Invite your child to read to or with you every day.
- When reading a book where the print is large, point word by word as you read. This will help the child learn that reading goes from left to right and understand that the word he or she says is the word he or she sees.
- Read a child's favorite book over and over again.
- Read many stories with rhyming words and lines that repeat. Invite the child to join in on these parts. Point, word by word, as he or she reads along with you.
- Discuss new words. For example, "This big house is called a palace. Who do you think lives in a palace?"
- Stop and ask about the pictures and about what is happening in the story.
- Read from a variety of children's books, including fairy tales, song books, poems, and information books.

CAVALIER "Wonderful Wordplay"

(From: "Reading Connection: Beginning Edition")

Use these activities to build your child's phonemic awareness - which is the ability to hear sounds in words. Phonemic Awareness is an important literacy skill that creates fluent readers.

- Choose a three-letter word, such as *cap*. Have your child substitute different beginning sounds from the alphabet to make new words (*lap, map, nap, rap, sap, tap, zap*). How many words can they think of?
- Pick a long word and tell your child to clap once as they say each syllable. For *mozzarella*, they would clap four times: *moz-za-rel-la*
- Ask your child to say a word without the first sound. Example: "Can you say sit without the s? (Answer: it)
- Think of a word, and give your child a "sound" clue to figure it out. For instance, "I'm thinking of a word for something that you chew but don't swallow. The word has an *uh* sound in the middle."
- (Answer: Gum)

STEM

The students started a STEM/ Problem Based Learning project that was inspired by their curiosity of one of my favorite topics......beekeeping! I shared with my students that I had my biggest honey harvest ever and have a slight problem —I am out of jars/bottles/containers to bottle the honey in. The kids jumped into the PBL with great enthusiasm completing tasks related to beekeeping and incorporating our 4th grade Math standards aligned with Chapter 1 and Numbers.

Listed below is an overview of the tasks and what we have been working on.

PBL - Presenting a real-world problem that needs to be solved.

- Task 1 Students were presented with a jar of honey. They needed to calculate the mass/quantity of honey that is in their jar. How many jars/containers will we need to contain 246 pounds of honey? The students used a scale to find the mass in pounds/oz. They also compared that to the weight of the same container holding water and other liquids with varying viscosity.
- Task 2 Students had to BEE creative and design their own honey label for their jar including necessary information such as weight, contact info and contents
- Task 3 Research and calculate the cost/or price for the honey in the amount that they have.
- Task 4 Calculate the total amount of honey that we have and how much we can sell it for.

Devise a marketing plan or strategy to sell their honey.

Calculate the total amount of money that we earn from selling the honey.

- Task 5 Brainstorm ideas of what to do with the money that we earn. Students came up with really good ideas for this some including:
 - 1. Give it back to the bees, donate it to a local charity or beekeeping club
 - 2. Buy some more jars and containers Buy classroom supplies or materials to help
 - 3. Teach others about the importance of pollinators and bees.
 - 4. Purchase labels printed from the designs that they created



Throughout the first nine weeks, students have been learning about our nation's capital while completing group projects focused on monuments, museums, or memorials they will visit during their trip. They will depart on Monday, October 20, and return Friday, October 24. As part of their preparation, students will also participate in the annual D.C. Essay Assembly on Tuesday, October 16, where they will share their essays on patriotic themes with the student body and a panel of judges. The top four students will earn the honor of placing the Coldwater wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. The theme for this year is "Unearthed," which challenges students to explore the past, uncover hidden stories, and use coding and engineering to bring their Lego robots to life. We are grateful for the many parent volunteers who help make this program possible. The students are preparing for competitions later this year, and we wish them the very best as they work together to create, problem-solve, and compete.

<u>PBIS Update</u> The first PBIS period ended on Friday, September 26, and we are proud of how our students are working to demonstrate positive behavior both in and out of the classroom. This success reflects a true partnership between home and school, and we sincerely appreciate the support you provide in helping your children grow into respectful, responsible role models. Students are working toward the 1st Semester PBIS Rewards Field Trip scheduled for January or February.

To attend, students must qualify during two of the three PBIS periods. Please continue encouraging your child to give their best effort in both academics and behavior—we know your support makes a big difference.

<u>Fall Sports Teams</u> Our fall athletic seasons are in full swing and will be wrapping up in just a couple of weeks. It has been exciting to see such a high level of participation, with nearly 60% of our junior high students involved in cheer, cross country, volleyball, or football.
