Families and Community Members,

Another incredible school year has come to a close! I continue to be inspired by the outstanding efforts of our Coldwater students, staff, and families. From academics and athletics to fine arts, clubs, activities, and community service, Coldwater continues to thrive because of the strong partnerships and values that define our school and town. I hope each of you finds time this summer to relax, recharge, and enjoy all that our community and the season have to offer.



This year ends on a hopeful note with the successful passage of our 0.5% income tax levy—on the third attempt. To every parent, grandparent, alumni, and community member who support-

ed this initiative: thank you. Your trust and commitment to Coldwater Schools are humbling. The passage of the levy brings much-needed relief, but it is not a final solution—it marks the beginning of a focused and strategic path forward.

In the weeks ahead, the Coldwater leadership team will work closely with the Board of Education to chart our course. A special work session will take place in June to carefully prioritize how these new funds are used. Our goals: stabilize our aging infrastructure, modernize instructional materials, and ensure long-term financial security—all while keeping class sizes reasonable and student outcomes strong.

We must remain cautious and forward-thinking, especially given the uncertainty surrounding future state support. While some legislators claim schools are more funded than ever, the reality in Coldwater paints a different picture. We are currently receiving less than what was promised to us under the Fair School Funding Plan. In fact, **Coldwater is projected to lose over \$1,000,000 in state funding starting in two years**. This projected decline will once again strain our ability to maintain programs, staffing, and facilities.

Meanwhile, the state continues to shift more funding toward private schools—often awarding nearly **twice as much per student** as public school students receive. These private schools are not held to the same standards of accountability as public schools. They are **not required to administer state tests**, **not issued state report cards**, **not audited by the State Auditor's Office**, and **not required to accept all students**. Coldwater, like all public schools, proudly opens its doors to every child, regardless of background or ability, and operates under all of these accountability measures with full transparency.

As we plan ahead, I also want to address some recent criticisms posted on social media regarding our hiring and supplemental compensation practices. While community dialogue is welcome, it is important that it is rooted in fact.

Since 2022, our district has maintained a fiscally responsible approach to hiring. Each year, we target our **new teacher hiring cohort** to have an average of **five years or fewer on the salary schedule**. This strategy allows us to remain within budget while still attracting talented educators. In fact, the average experience level for all new hires from 2022 through 2026 is 4.35 years.

In alignment with **Ohio Revised Code Section 3317.14**, any teacher with **five or more years of prior experience must be credited with a minimum of five years on the salary schedule**. Our negotiated agreement further caps that initial placement at **no more than ten years**. When we do consider candidates with more experience, we **negotiate thoughtfully** to ensure that the overall average experience level of the cohort remains within our targeted five-year range. As for coaching and supplemental contracts, any suggestion that raises are given arbitrarily is simply false. All supplemental positions—whether for coaching, advising, or directing—are governed by our **master agreement with the Coldwater Teachers' Organization**. Adjustments to these stipends occur only through negotiated agreements and **never as individual raises**. In reality, if we calculated compensation based on hours worked, many of our coaches and advisors would be earning **around 25 cents per hour**.

I stand fully behind the **character**, **integrity**, **and commitment** of every staff member who holds a supplemental position or any position within the district. These individuals give their heart and soul to our students—mentoring them, modeling what it means to lead with purpose, and always putting students first. We should all be incredibly thankful for the professionals who invest so deeply in the development of our kids.

To ensure long-term planning, I've asked our leadership team to develop a **5-, 10-, and 15-year operational roadmap** that will complement—rather than replace—our existing strategic plan. These plans will address:

- Staffing and future hiring needs
- Course offerings and student programming
- Technology and AI integration
- Daily and yearly schedules
- Facility and enrollment capacity—especially in areas like the kitchen
- Internal systems, protocols, and operational processes

We are also providing the **2025–2026** and **2026–2027** school calendars in this Cav Connection (see pages 46–47) and online at: <u>https://coldwatercavs.org/about-us/district-calendars</u>

Each calendar includes a one-week "dead period" during the first week of July—a practice we've continued in partnership with the Memorial Park staff—to give families a dedicated time to rest, travel, or spend time together without the demands of school events or activities.

We are **intentionally holding off** on finalizing the 2027–2028 calendar until the Ohio General Assembly finalizes **House Bill 145**, which may alter the **minimum required instructional hours** for public schools. Once finalized, we will release that calendar and post it online with the others.

We remain fully committed to transparency, responsibility, and—most importantly—keeping students at the heart of every decision. Thank you again for your continued support and for believing in the work we do together. Coldwater Schools is more than a district—it's a reflection of the people and pride that make this community special.

FROM THE DESK OF THE TREASURER, JENN MCCOY:

Financial Update

At the May 14th Board of Education meeting, I presented the updated Five-Year Forecast, which was subsequently approved by the Board. This financial projection is grounded in a comprehensive analysis of historical data and current economic conditions, which are then used to estimate revenue and expenditures in future years. It is important to note that variables influencing the forecast may shift throughout the fiscal year. While cash flow monitoring serves as

an essential tool to detect unanticipated variances, no forecasting model can offer absolute certainty. The primary objective of the Five-Year Forecast is to illustrate the district's financial trajectory and serve as a strategic guide for making informed decisions that promote long-term fiscal responsibility and sustainability.

The forecast, along with supporting documentation and notes, is publicly available on the Ohio Department of Education website for those interested in reviewing it in greater detail.

In other fiscal developments, the Bond Maintenance Levy has officially expired, resulting in a savings of 0.5 mills for property taxpayers in the upcoming year. This levy previously generated approximately \$60,000 annually, with an additional \$46,000 provided through state matching funds. Originally mandated as a condition of the Bond Levy, these funds were strictly designated for infrastructure and equipment expenditures related to our renovation projects. Moving forward, such expenditures will need to be supported by the district's general fund.

Additionally, we are pleased to report the successful passage of the 0.5% income tax increase in May. This measure is projected to generate approximately \$1.4 million annually to support the district's operating expenses. We extend our sincere gratitude to the community for its continued support.

Legislative Developments Under Review

Several legislative proposals currently under consideration could significantly impact our financial outlook:

House Bill 96: Proposes the elimination of the Fair School Funding Plan.

Property Tax Reform: Could alter the structure and distribution of local funding for public education.

Continuation of the Fair School Funding Plan: Advocates are urging legislators to fulfill their commitment to fully implement the final two years of the six-year funding phase-in.

In total, there are currently 25 House Bills and 25 Senate Bills pending in the Ohio General Assembly that pertain directly to primary and secondary education. We continue to monitor these developments closely and will provide updates as new information becomes available.

Health Reminders for the Upcoming School Year From School Nurse


As you prepare for the upcoming school year don't forget to review the health information below. Please keep this article all year to help remind you of this important health information.

- If your child has ANY health concerns, please discuss this with your child's teacher(s) as well as the school nurse.
 <u>It is important to do this every year</u>. Please give updates on any of your child's health concerns as often as need-ed throughout the year.
- Be sure to send in your child's updated shot records if your child is in kindergarten, 7th or 12th grade OR you have been notified that your child's shot record is not up to date. <u>This is a state law, and your child can be excluded</u> from school if the proper paperwork is not submitted.
- The medication policy states <u>ALL medication must come in its original container</u>. Absolutely no baggies or any other containers will be accepted.
- **Prescription medication** MUST have a signed order from the doctor/nurse practitioner who prescribed the medication. <u>No medication can be given without that order</u>. Medication forms are in each building office as well as the nurse's clinic.
- **Over the counter medication** must have a form filled out by the parent. Those forms can also be found in each of the building offices or the nurse's clinic.
- <u>ALL medication must be checked in with the nurse.</u> Parents or responsible students can bring medication to the building office (high, middle or elementary offices) or directly to the nurse's office.
- <u>Please keep your child home when they are sick.</u> Particularly if they have a fever over 100.4 degrees, vomiting, frequent diarrhea, head lice, any undiagnosed rash, a bad cough, or is too sick to handle normal school activities. Please remember to call the office to report your child's illness. If your child sees a doctor and the doctor requests they be off school, you can bring in a doctor's excuse for those absences. This is not always required, but can be helpful with your child's attendance record.
- Vision and Hearing screenings will be conducted for students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 (vision only for grade 7). You can request a screening be done on your child any time throughout the year by contacting the nurse. Teachers may request this for your child as well.
- Please contact Jodi Weigel, School Nurse at 419-678-2611 extension 3315 with any health concerns any time throughout the year.

Give Me a Smile

A fund has been established by an anonymous donor at the Mercer County Civic Foundation to provide orthodontic braces to deserving Coldwater youth. This opportunity is available to all Coldwater youth and is called "Give Me a Smile." The program provides a free initial screening and then covers the cost of orthodontic braces with little cost to the family for the duration of the treatment. Coldwater Elementary Summer Reading/Math Incentive 2025



This summer the team at Coldwater Elementary will again have a summer reading/math incentive program for our Little Cavaliers to encourage and motivate students to read, study math facts, and work on other skills throughout the summer. Each student was given a packet of information by their homeroom teacher to take home at the end of the year about this program that explains the goal, various ways of accomplishing the goal, and the incentive/reward. This information was also emailed to all CWEL families. If you cannot locate this packet, you can pick one up in the elementary office, check the Coldwater Elementary website for the links, or the Coldwater Elementary Facebook page. Incentive requirements are explained below as well. Students who complete the incentive will get to have either a play day at the park for 2025-26 first and second grade students or a swimming day at the pool for 2025-26 third and fourth grade students with the date TBD. You will also have the opportunity to purchase Kona Ice on this day! Please encourage your children to read and practice other skills this summer to be prepared for the 2025-26 school year.

Students who are going into 1st and 2nd grades:

You will need to read a minimum of 400 minutes (1st Grade) or 500 minutes (2nd Grade) throughout the summer. You will also need to practice your addition and subtraction facts a minimum of 40 times for five minutes each time. Here are some ways that you can achieve this. **Parents, you may read to your child if necessary and count those minutes toward the goal.*

- 1) Go to the Public Library and participate in their summer reading program. You do not have to have all 400 or 500 minutes by the end of the library reading program. You can use the library reading program to help you towards the goal of reading minutes.
- 2) If you ordered the *Summer Bridge* book offered from the PTO you can count that time towards your minutes **AND** you would need to return it to your teacher the first day of school. If you work on math related skills count that as part of your math time, and if you are doing reading related skills count that towards your reading time. (If you did not order one and want to, you can do so on Amazon.com)
- 3) If your teacher sends home a summer work packet, you may also count that time towards your goal. If you are working on math skills for ten minutes then that can count as well. Also if you are working on some reading skills then those minutes can count towards that also.
- 4) You can log onto xtramath.org and practice math facts. You can also just use your addition and subtraction flashcards. Whichever you choose to do, practice them for five minutes at a time and this must be done 40 times throughout the summer.

Students who are going into 3rd or 4th grades:

You will need to read a minimum of 700 minutes throughout the summer. You will also need to practice your addition/ subtraction facts (if needed) and your multiplication/division facts a minimum of 40 times for five minutes each time. Here are some ways that you can achieve this.

1. Go to the Public Library and participate in their summer reading program. You do not have to have all 700 minutes by the end of the library reading program. You can use the library reading program to help you towards the goal of 700 reading minutes.

- 2. If you ordered the *Summer Bridge* book offered from the PTO you can count that time towards your minutes **AND** you would need to return it to your teacher the first day of school. If you work on math related skills count that as part of your math time, and if you are doing reading related skills count that towards your reading time. (If you did not order one and want to, you can do so on Amazon.com)
- 3. If your teacher sends home a summer work packet, you may also count that time towards your goal. If you are working on math skills for ten minutes then that can count as well. Also if you are working on some reading skills then those minutes can count towards that also.
- 4. You can log onto xtramath.org and practice math facts. You can also just use your addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division flashcards. Whichever method you choose to do, practice them for five minutes at a time and this must be done 40 times throughout the summer

**If you have a child who is being tutored this summer, please feel free to use that time also. Whatever time they are spending on reading, count those minutes for the reading time and whatever time spent on Math, count that as math time.

In order for your child to earn the reward, he/she must return the attached recording form on either the first or second day of the 2025-26 school year. The turn in due dates are as follows: Tuesday, August 19th or Wednesday, August 20th, 2025. All forms must be signed by a parent and turned in on one of these two days.

If you do this, you do not have to turn in the recording form at the beginning of the year. Each time you click on the link you can enter information for your child and the system will record it. You may enter information at one time for the entire summer or enter information throughout the summer.

Summer Tips for "Little Cav" READING Success

Efforts should be made during the summer to help children sustain reading skills, practice reading and read for enjoyment. Parents should remember that children need free time in the summer to relax and enjoy the pleasures of childhood. So summer reading should be fun. Following are a few tips to make reading enjoyable for your children this summer:

1. Read aloud together with your child every day.

Make it fun by reading outdoors on the front steps, patio, at the beach or park. Also, let your children read to you. For younger children, point out the relationship between words and sounds.

2. Set a good example!

Parents must be willing to model behavior for their children. Keep lots of reading material around the house. Turn off the TV and have each person read his or her book, including mom and dad.

3. Read the same book your child is reading and discuss it.

This is the way to develop habits of the mind and build capacity for thought and insight.

- 4. Let kids choose what they want to read, and don't turn your nose up at popular fiction.
- It will only discourage the reading habit.
- 5. Buy books on tape, especially for a child with a learning disability.

Listen to them in the car, or turn off the TV and have the family listen to them together.

6. Take your children to the library regularly.

Most libraries sponsor summer reading clubs with easy-to-reach goals for preschool and school-age children. Check the library calendar for special summer reading activities and events. Libraries also provide age appropriate lists for summer reading.

7. Subscribe, in your child's name, to magazines like *Sports Illustrated for Kids*, *Highlights for Children*, or *National Geographic World*.

Encourage older children to read the newspaper and current events magazines, to keep up the reading habit over the summer and develop vocabulary. Ask them what they think about what they've read, and listen to what they say.

8. Ease disappointment over summer separation from a favorite school friend by encouraging them to become pen pals.

Present both children with postcards or envelopes that are already addressed and stamped. If both children have access to the Internet, email is another option.

9. Make trips a way to encourage reading by reading aloud traffic signs, billboards, notices.

Show your children how to read a map, and once you are on the road, let them take turns being the navigator.

10. Encourage children to keep a summer scrapbook.

Tape in souvenirs of your family's summer activities picture postcards, ticket stubs, photos. Have your children write the captions and read them and read them aloud as you look at the book together.

Creative Summer Learning Ideas (from scholastic.com)

There's no getting around it: Over the summer months, our students can lose up to 60% of the math and reading skills that they learned during the year. Here are dozens of ideas to keep them learning and dozens of fun activities to share with parents.



For Grades K–3:

Shopaholic: What can you buy for \$5 at the corner store? From the ice cream truck? In a hardware store? At the beach?

Change it up: Start collecting change in a jar on the first day of summer. On the last day, estimate your change, count it, and plan a special purchase.

Summer patterns: Create patterns using summer items (popsicle sticks, shells, flowers). Or, draw patterns in the sand or dirt using a stick or your hands. See how long you can carry out your pattern — along the length of the sandbox, or across the grass.

Napkin fractions: Fold paper towels or napkins into large and small fractions, from one-half to 1/16. Use markers to label and decorate the different fractions.

Design hunt: Keep an eye out for shapes, patterns, and designs when you're out and about. You never know what you'll find in the architecture at the airport, the shopping mall, or even the grocery store.

100% delicious: Use ice cream to make fraction sundaes. Can you make an ice cream sundae that is one-half vanilla and one-half chocolate? What about one-third chocolate, one-third vanilla, and one-third strawberry? Can you cover a scoop of ice cream with one-quarter each of nuts, sprinkles, cookie crumbs, and gummy bears? Or can you eat a bite of ice cream that is one-half chocolate, one-half vanilla? For older children, calculate the percentage of each ice cream flavor in the sundae.

For Grades 4–8:

Record-breakers: Use a stopwatch to time yourself running, roller blading, swimming, or biking. Then try to beat your time. Be sure to keep the distance you're moving the same for each trial. Graph the results. (You may need a partner for this.)

Where will you be? Using a map, calculate where you will be if you travel 20, 50, 100, or 1,000 miles from home.

How many ways? As you're exploring your neighborhood during the summer, how many routes can you take to the school, the grocery store, the mall, or your friend's house? The catch: No backtracking, and you must take a new route each time.

Let's eat: Prepare a meal or dish for the family. Before you go to the supermarket, find a recipe, write what you need and how much. At the supermarket, choose the best-priced option.

Summer Reading Activities

These ideas will keep kids engaged in reading, writing, and thinking creatively even on the hottest days.

Water writer: Using a pail of water and a brush, have kids write words on the blacktop or sidewalk.

Sell summer: Tell kids: Try a new product or activity and write about it. How would you describe it? Would you recommend it? Create an advertisement to sell it to others.

Plan a trip: Have kids use the Internet, travel guidebooks, brochures, and maps to plan a dream day, weekend, week, or month-long trip.

Summer sleuth: Have kids follow a story in a newspaper during the summer, or investigate a local story (e.g., an upcoming fair). Tell kids: Write about the event as it unfolds so that you have it documented from start to finish.

Play it: Take an adventure book with a clear plot (*The Phantom Tollbooth*, *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, etc.) and invent a board game based on it.

Comic strip: Write a comic strip about a fictional character or yourself. See how long you can keep the strip going. Read classic comics for inspiration.

Summer Science Fun

Summer is the perfect time for children to explore their extracurricular interests, like science. Here are some activities that will have children hypothesizing all the way to September.

Map the weather: Keep a running log of the weather. Include temperature, humidity, clouds, precipitation, wind, air pressure. Can you predict what the weather will be to-morrow?


Invent a recipe for a summer drink and share it with your friends. For example, the Citrus Sizzler: 1/2 cup Sprite, 1/2 cup pineapple juice, 1 spritz lime juice.

Museum gallery: Collect pinecones, rocks, shells, or other natural objects to organize, categorize, and label. Present your own natural history museum.

Hot-weather inventor: Design an invention that you can use during summer. Some ideas: sunglasses that change color from red to yellow to blue, or a new beach toy.

Answer a question: How long does it take an ice cube to melt outside in the summer heat? In the refrigerator? In an air conditioned room?

Float or sink: In a pool or the bathtub, hypothesize which items (soap, dry sock, bottle of shampoo, rock, etc.) will float or sink. Test your hypotheses.



Keeping Kids Motivated

Parent involvement during the summer months is crucial to student success. According to the National Education Association, "Parents who are actively involved in their children's learning at home help their children become more successful learners in and out of school." Encourage parents with a final newsletter full of activities that will stave off forgetfulness and even build skills over the summer.

Set aside time each day to read. Track the books your child reads and reward him or her with a special activity or treat when he or she reaches certain milestones (for example, every 10th book). Do art projects based on favorite titles, such as drawing a favorite scene, or making paper bag puppets.

Visit your local library. Many libraries have wonderful summer reading programs that reward children for the number of books they read.

Make every day educational. Children learn problem-solving, math, science, and vocabulary as they help with groceries, laundry, and cooking.

Create a summer scrapbook. Save postcards and movie tickets, record family stories or interesting events from each day, whether you're going on vacation or just going to your neighborhood park.

Roadworthy Car Games

For kids on the bus or families on vacation, put those long rides to good use with activities that keep the kids busy and build reading and math skills.

For grades K–3:

Car bingo: Create a car bingo card with words, shapes, colors, and items that children will likely see during a trip (stop signs, billboards, railroad signs, etc.) to reinforce reading skills, math, and sight words.

The number game: Look out the window and call out when you see one, two, three, or four of something, and so on.

The alphabet game: One person chooses the right side of the road, and the other chooses the left. Call out objects that you see in alphabetical order (you can use a sign only for one letter). The first person to get to the letter "z" wins.

For grades 4–8:

Capital game: Take note of each license plate you see, not by state, but by state capital. The first to correctly identify 10 state capitals wins.

Cow game: One person takes the right side of the road, the other takes the left. Keep count of all the cows you see. You earn one point for each cow. When you see a cemetery out of your side of the car, you lose all your points.

Animals galore: Decide on a number of points for each animal that you see (cow = 1 point, horse = 1 point, pig = 2 points, etc.). As you drive, add up the points. Play until one person gets 10 points, or for a set time.

Math with license plates: Use the numbers on license plates to practice addition, subtraction, multiplication, and number patterns and see just how creative kids can get!



Coldwater won't be the same without you, but we are *better* because of you. You're one of the good ones. One of the real ones. And even in retirement, I'm pretty sure we'll still hear an occasional "Come on, Chief!" from down the hallway in our memories. Congratulations, Big Fish. You will be missed more than you know.




Ending the Year with Purpose: Celebrating the "Power of ONE" During Get REAL Week 2025





Ohio FFA Agronomy Judging

This year's Coldwater FFA members who participated in the Agronomy judging were Madison Zwiebel, Madelyn Lange, Haley Tobin, David Dippold and Jonathan Lange. Our team tackled the challenge of identifying a variety of plants, seeds, insects, and even pesky plant diseases. They put their knowledge to the test with a written exam and participated in an engaging team event that required them to create an agronomy plan for a farmer's field.





Ohio FFA Wildlife Judging

This year's Coldwater FFA members who participated in the Wildlife Judging CDE were Emily Wendel, Lauren Beckman, Kameron Bird, Alex Penno and Will Wehrkamp. This team was tested over their knowledge of the fish and wildlife industries, including identifying specimens of different mammals, birds, fish, reptiles, plants, and equipment. They also answered questions about pond management, habitat management, and game laws and safety.

District Outdoor Power

The Outdoor Power CDE tests the participants knowledge and technical skills in the field of small engine mechanics and outdoor power equipment. Through hands-on problem solving and technical assessments, our members demonstrated their abilities in engine troubleshooting, parts identification, tool selection, and the fundamentals of equipment operation.



Sophomore Agriculture & Industrial Tech Classes Tour Local Businesses

Recently Mrs. Wenning's sophomore Agriculture classes & Mr. Horstman's Industrial Tech classes went on a field trip to four local manufacturing businesses.
